The prevalence of dementia among older adults increased with age, from 2% among adults aged 65-69 to 33% among adults aged 90 and older. Despite the similar prevalence of dementia across both genders at all ages, there were more women living with dementia (1.8 million) than men (1.5 million), likely due to differential mortality.

A Profile of Older Adults with Dementia and their ...

Alzheimer's disease is the most common type of dementia. Though dementia mostly affects older adults, it is not a part of normal aging. How common is dementia? Of those at least 65 years of age, there is an estimated 5.0 million adults with dementia in 2014 and projected to be nearly 14 million by 2060.

Read about mixed dementia, a combination of two or more types of dementia. For example, older adults with dementia may have Alzheimer's and vascular dementia. Vascular Contributions to Cognitive Impairment and Dementia Vascular contributions to cognitive impairment and dementia (VCID) affect memory, thinking, and behavior.

Though dementia generally involves memory loss, memory loss has different causes. Having memory loss alone doesn't mean you have dementia. Alzheimer's disease is the most common cause of a progressive dementia in older adults, but there are a number of causes of dementia. Alzheimer's Disease in People with Down Syndrome Many, but not all, people with Down syndrome develop Alzheimer's disease when they get older. People with Down syndrome are born with an extra copy of chromosome 21, which carries the APP gene. This gene produces a specific protein called amyloid precursor protein (APP).

Dementia is a syndrome in which there is deterioration in memory, thinking, behaviour and the ability to perform everyday activities. Although dementia mainly affects older people, it is not a normal part of ageing. Worldwide, around 50 million people have dementia, and there are nearly 10 million new cases every year.

Dementia is rare in adults younger than 60. But after age 60, dementia becomes increasingly common. While 7% of adults 60 and older have dementia, nearly 30% of those 85 and older do. The two most common causes of dementia are Alzheimer's disease and vascular dementia.

Of the 878 individuals with DS, 353 (40%) had a diagnosis of dementia (DS dementia) (Table 1). Dementia diagnosis was associated with older age (58.7 years vs 55.9 years; P < .001), but no significant differences in sex or race/ethnicity were found (Table 1).

The prevalence of caregiving difficulty existed on a continuum across the four groups, with the highest prevalence observed among caregivers assisting older persons with dementia and disability (70.9%), followed by caregivers of older adults with dementia but not disability (65.3%), caregivers of older adults with disability but not dementia (58.2%), and caregivers of older adults without dementia or disability (47.4%) (Table 4). Family and Other Unpaid Caregivers and Older Adults with ...

Alzheimer's disease and other dementias are not a part of normal aging. Almost 40 per cent of people over the age of 65 experience some form of memory loss. When there is no underlying medical condition causing this memory loss, it is known as "age-associated memory impairment," which is considered a part of the normal aging process.

The biggest risk factor for dementia is age - the older you are the more likely you are to develop the condition, but it is not an inevitable part of ageing.
