This new national historical park preserves the same landscapes that Tubman used to carry herself and others away from slavery.

Harriet Tubman, née Araminta Ross, (born c. 1820, Dorchester county, Maryland, U.S.—died March 10, 1913, Auburn, New York), American bondwoman who escaped from slavery in the South to become a leading abolitionist before the American Civil War.

Born into slavery, Tubman escaped and subsequently made some 13 missions to rescue approximately 70 enslaved people, including family and friends, using the network of antislavery activists and safe houses known as the Underground Railroad. During the American Civil War, she served as an armed scout and spy for the Union Army.

Its most famous conductor was Harriet Tubman. The Underground Railroad (UR) was not underground nor was it a railroad. It was called "underground" because of its secretive nature and "railroad" because it was an emerging form of transportation. The UR was an informal network and had many routes.

Harriet Tubman knew that traveling back and forth along the Underground Railroad meant that she and her followers were at risk of being attacked by the police, hunting dogs, mobs, bounty hunters, and notoriously cruel slave catchers. At one point, Tubman's efforts freeing slaves led to a call for a \$40,000 bounty on her head.

Tubman: Conductor of the Underground Railroad After Harriet Tubman escaped from slavery, she returned to slave-holding states many times to help other slaves escape. She led them safely to the northern free states and to Canada. It was very dangerous to be a runaway slave.
